A service of prayer, reflection with music from Taize, and Imposition of Ashes. Communion will be said after the service of reflection, for those who wish to partake of the Eucharist. The music for the songs is provided on a separate sheet.

The Greeting

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you and also with you.

Tonight's service marks the beginning of Lent. After the confession, you will be invited to come up for the imposition of the ashes, as a sign of mortality and penitence.

We will be worshipping tonight in the style of Taize. The Taize Community is an international ecumenical Christian monastery in France. One of its trademarks is the singing of distinctive and prayers during candlelit services. Taizé music highlights simple phrases, usually lines from the Psalms or other pieces of scripture, sung repeatedly in different languages. The repetition is designed to help meditation and prayer. All the songs in tonight's service will be sung in both English and Ukrainian. As the anniversary of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine approaches

this week, we especially remember our Ukrainian friends and we pray for peace and justice in Ukraine.

Song: Laudate Omnes Gentes – Sing praises, all ye people (Taize) – Latin: Laudate omnes gentes, laudate Dominum. Laudate omnes genets, laudate Dominum.

Ukrainian: Khvalite vsi narody, khvalite Hospoda. Kvalite vsi narody, khvalite Hospoda.

English: Sing praises all ye people, sing praises to the Lord. Sing praises all ye people, sing praises to the Lord.

Since early days Christians have observed with great devotion the time of our Lord's passion and resurrection and prepared for this by a season of penitence and fasting. By carefully keeping these days, Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel, and so grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord. I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy word.

The Collect

Let us pray for grace to keep Lent faithfully.

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent: create and make in us new and contrite hearts that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Readings for Ash Wednesday:

FIRST READING: Joel 2. 1-2 & 12-17

Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near - a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come. Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain-offering and a drinkoffering for the LORD, your God? Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy. Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the LORD, weep. Let them say, 'Spare your people, O LORD, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations. Why should it be said among the peoples, "Where is their God?"

SECOND READING: Psalm 51. 1-17

Response: Have mercy on me, O God, and cleanse me from my sin. Have mercy on me, O God, according to your loving-kindness; in your great compassion blot out my offences. Wash me through and through from my wickedness and cleanse me from my sin. For I know my

transgressions, and my sin is ever before me. Against you only have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight.

And so you are justified when you speak and upright in your judgement.

Had you desired it, I would have offered sacrifice, but you take no delight in burnt-offerings. The sacrifice of God is a troubled spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.

HOLY GOSPEL: John 8. 1-11

Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. Early in the morning he came again to the temple. All the people came to him and he sat down and began to teach them. The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery; and making her stand before all the people, they said to Jesus, 'Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. Now in the law Moses commanded us to stone such women. Now what do you say?' They said this to test Jesus, so that they might have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and wrote with

his finger on the ground. When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, 'Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.' And once again he bent down and wrote on the ground. When they heard it, they went away, one by one, beginning with the elders; and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before him. Jesus straightened up and said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' She said, 'No one, sir.' And Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again.'

For all false judgements, for uncharitable thoughts towards our neighbours and for our prejudice and contempt towards those who differ from us. **Accept our repentance, Lord.**

For our waste and pollution of your creation and our lack of concern for those who come after us.

Accept our repentance, Lord.

Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us. Favourably hear us, for your mercy is great.

Accomplish in us the work of your salvation, that we may show your glory in the world.

By the cross and passion of your Son our Lord, bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.
